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Priority Cohort Student Survey

The GEAR UP evaluation team at Edvantia surveyed 11th- and 12th-grade students ("Priority" group) in GEAR UP schools to gather information about their knowledge and awareness about college, academic progression, and aspirations for educational attainment. This brief summary highlights the major findings of the 11th- and 12th-grade student survey.

Methods

The student survey was administered to "priority" students during August and September of 2008. The evaluation team mailed administration instructions, 11th-/12th-grade surveys to high schools in nine counties. The returned surveys were collected by site coordinators or mailed directly to Edvantia. The results were used as baseline data for setting benchmarks for WV GEAR UP program. A total of 546 11th-grade, and 699 12th-grade students completed the survey. The response rates of 11th- and 12th-grade students are 32% and 35%. Table 1 lists the number of respondents by each school.

Major Findings

The major findings of the priority student survey are presented in this section.

Knowledge about college. Students were asked to report whether someone from their school had spoken with them about college entrance requirements and the availability of financial aid to help them pay for college (see Table 2). More than half of respondents from each grade reported that they had talked with someone in school about the college entrance requirements and the availability of financial aid. Generally, respondents from 12th grade were more likely to have such experiences than were 11th graders.

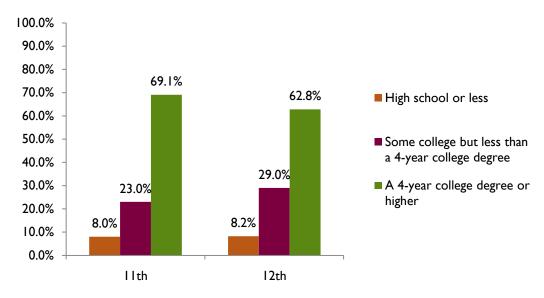


Figure 1. Percentages of Respondents Reporting the Highest Level of Education They **Expected to Obtain**

Educational expectations. Students were asked to report the highest level of education they expected to obtain. As shown in Figure 1, the majority of the respondents indicated that they expected to obtain a 4-year college degree or higher, regardless of their grade levels. However, the percentage of 12th-grade students who expected to obtain a 4-year college or higher degree is lower than their peers in 11th grade. The 12th-graders, however, are more likely than the 11th-grade students to expect to attend college but earn less than a 4-year college degree.

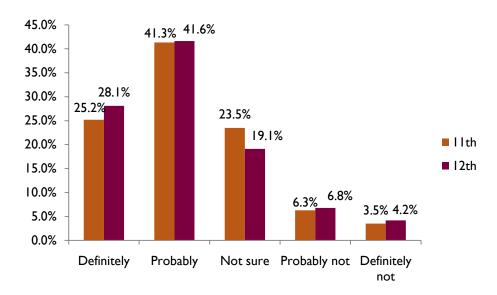


Figure 2. Percentages of Respondents Reporting Whether They Thought They Could Afford to Attend a Public 4-Year College Using Financial Aid, Scholarships, and Family Resources

Perceptions of affordability. The survey asked priority students whether they thought they could afford to attend a public 4-year college using financial aid, scholarships, and family resources (see Figure 2). For each grade, respondents were most likely to report they probably could afford to attend a public 4- year college using all available funds. About a quarter of all respondents believed that they definitely could afford a public 4-year college. There were slightly more than 6% of respondents from each grade thinking that they probably could not

afford a public 4-year college and only 3 or 4% of respondents believed that they definitely could not afford a public 4-year college.

Aspiration scales. The student survey contains 23 items that focus on factors influencing student educational aspirations, including two internal orientations (as a leader and an achiever), and two external supports (a positive environment and teacher support). Factor analysis confirmed four subscales: leader orientation (7 items), achiever orientation (5 items), teacher support (6 items), and positive environment (5 items). The descriptive statistics of the 23 items, which had response options ranging from 1 (strongly disagree) to 5 (strongly agree) and 4 subscales, which were formed by taking the mean of the scores for each item in the subscale, for each grade are presented in Table 4. Significance tests were conducted between 11th- and 12th-grade students. Leader orientation refers to students perceiving themselves as leaders and role models for other students, and being able to solve problems and take control of situations. Respondents in 12th grade scored significantly higher than their 11th-grade counterparts (t = -3.26, df = 1137). Students with high scores on "Achiever orientation" have high expectations for themselves and believe their teachers have high expectations about their ability to put forth the effort necessary to succeed and improve. Respondents from the two grades were similar to each other for this scale (t = .30, df = 1135). Eleventh-grade students perceived significantly less teacher support than their counterparts in 12th grade (t = -2.499, df = 1136). There was no difference between 11th- and 12th-grade students in their perceptions of the school environment (t = .45, df = 1124).

Conclusions and Recommendations

The findings from the student survey indicated that priority students presented some similarities across the two grades. They generally possessed high educational aspirations. The majority of the respondents expected to obtain a postsecondary education degree after high school. The majority thought that they could afford to attend a public 4-year college using all available funds. They generally perceived themselves as leaders and role models and were confident in making achievements. They also reported a high level of teacher support and positive school environment.

However, there were still some 11th- and 12th-grade students who had not talked with school staff about the college entrance requirements and the availability of the financial aid for college. Similarly, some 11th and 12th grade students were not sure about the affordability of attending a public 4-year college. While it may not be reasonable to expect that 100% of priority group students will ever report having spoken with school or GEAR UP staff about college or financial aid or believe they can afford college, the GEAR UP staff may wish to reflect on whether the percentages found in this survey align with their expectations for the program.
